INDIVIDUAL SCHOOL REPORT

DILWORTH SCHOOL

1. NAME, LOCATION, AND TYPE OF SCHOOL.

The Dilworth Elementary School, formerly a part of the Highland School, is in the Highland District, East End, and is located on the site of the old homestead of the Dilworth family, hence its name.

It is considered a very fine piece of school architecture, - simple and dignified in design and very attractive in both interior and exterior.

The building has a frontage of two hundred seventy-five (275) feet on Stanton Ave. It occupies an entire block and has entrances from Collins Ave. on the west, St. Marie St. on the south, and a private entrance to the Kindergarten, which occupies the extreme eastern end of the building.

2. HISTORY.

The school was opened and the building dedicated in the Fall Semester of 1915. At the time of the dedication Mr. John C. Dilworth presented to the school a beautiful oil painting of his mother and it now hangs on the wall of the first floor corridor as a loving tribute to Motherhood, for she gave seven sons and three daughters to the world and they all had great reverence for this mother.
